Before the CT Scan

✓ Stop taking any medications with iron 48 hours before your appointment.

Day before CT Scan

✓ You may have solid foods until midnight. After midnight, you may have clear fluids only such as water, apple juice, black tea or coffee until your appointment.

Day of your CT Scan

- ✓ If you take medications with iron, do not take them.
- ✓ Take your other regular medications.
- ✓ Wear loose comfortable clothes. If possible avoid zippers, belts and wire under garments.
- ✓ Once you arrive for your CT scan, you will be given several glasses of contrast dye with water to drink.
- ✓ About 1 hour after you begin drinking, you will have your CT scan.
- ✓ One to 2 hours after your CT scan, you will have loose watery stools. Be near a toilet.
- ✓ Before the scan begins, you may be given a needle to inject x-ray dye to improve the quality of the images.

If you have diabetes - day of your CT scan

You may have solid foods until midnight. After midnight, you may have clear fluids only such as water, apple juice, black tea or coffee until your appointment.

Check your blood sugar the morning of your procedure. If you have a low blood sugar, treat it as you normally would, and let the staff know when you arrive for your procedure, If you need to take your diabetes pills or insulin with food while you are at the hospital for your procedure:

- Bring the medication and food with you to the hospital.
- Bring your insulin pen, blood glucose monitor and supplies to the hospital.
- Usually, you will be able to eat and take your diabetes medication including insulin within 1 to 4 hours after the procedure is done.
