

## Living with your valved PICC problems and what to do

- ✓ Always wash your hands before you do anything with your PICC, IV tubing or dressing.
- $\checkmark$  Gloves are worn if you have a cut, a rash or an infection on your hands.
- ✓ When cleaning with an alcohol wipe or antiseptic swab rub well with friction for 15 seconds. Allow to dry.
- ✓ As you become more independent with your PICC care, here are some suggestions to help you if you run into problems.
- ✓ If you are not sure what to do or have a concern about your PICC, call your visiting nurse.

What you will see	What is the problem?	What to do
Wet around the cap.	• Exposure to moisture, such as a shower.	<ul> <li>Dry off with an alcohol wipe/ antiseptic swab.</li> </ul>
	Cap is loose.	<ol> <li>Clean the connection between cap and PICC.</li> <li>Put on a new cap.</li> <li>Call your visiting nurse.</li> </ol>
Cap falls off.	<ul> <li>Cap is not tight, or</li> <li>Cap has cracked.</li> </ul>	<ol> <li>If your PICC has clamps, make sure they are all closed.</li> <li>Clean the end of the PICC.</li> <li>Put on a new cap.</li> <li>Call your visiting nurse.</li> </ol>

What you will see	What is the problem?	What to do
Sluggish to flush.	<ul> <li>PICC may be kinked or twisted.</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Straighten any kinks or twists.</li> </ul>
		<ul> <li>You may have to check under the dressing.</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>Build up of blood or medication inside the PICC.</li> </ul>	<ol> <li>Flush well in between medications and when capping off.</li> </ol>
		<ol> <li>You may need to flush with more solution or more often.</li> </ol>
		3. Call your visiting nurse.
When you are flushing, you cannot push the solution in. Do not force the flush you may rupture the PICC.	<ul> <li>There is a kink or a twist in the PICC.</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Straighten any kinks or twists.</li> <li>You may need to check under the dressing.</li> </ul>
	• Tip of the PICC is resting against the vein.	<ol> <li>Try changing your position, sit up, lie down, move your head.</li> </ol>
		<ol> <li>Take a deep breath and lift your arms and then try again.</li> </ol>
	<ul> <li>Your PICC may be blocked or out of position.</li> </ul>	<ul><li>Call your visiting nurse.</li><li>You may need to come to the hospital to unblock.</li></ul>

What you will see	What is the problem?	What to do
The IV is not running well.	<ul> <li>The clamps on the IV tubing may be closed or there is a pump problem.</li> </ul>	Check the entire system.
	<ul> <li>Tip of the PICC is against the wall of the vein.</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Try changing your position; sit up, lie down or move your head.</li> </ul>
		<ul> <li>Take a deep breath and lift your arms and then try again.</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>The PICC may be kinked, twisted or blocked. You may have to check under the dressing.</li> </ul>	<ul><li>Check and straighten any kinks or twists.</li><li>Call your visiting nurse.</li></ul>
Leaking at the site or under the dressing.	<ul> <li>The PICC may have a crack in it.</li> <li>The PICC may be broken.</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Cap off PICC if infusing.</li> <li>If there is bleeding tie the end off, or bend the catheter back on itself and tape. You may need to carefully pull 2.5 to 5 cm (1 to 2 in) of the catheter out from the site.</li> <li>Cover with a clean dressing or cloth.</li> <li>Immediately call and go to the hospital where your PICC was inserted or emergency.</li> </ul>

What you will see	What is the problem?	What to do
At the site where the PICC leaves your skin or along the path of the PICC you notice: • redness • swelling • drainage • tenderness • soreness	<ul><li>PICC problem.</li><li>Infection.</li><li>Irritation.</li></ul>	Call your visiting nurse.
Fever, chills, sweating	<ul> <li>May be an infection.</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Immediately call and go to the hospital where your PICC was inserted or emergency.</li> </ul>
Swelling of the arm, neck or face, on the side that the PICC is located.	<ul> <li>PICC may be causing a problem with your venous system.</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Immediately call and go to the hospital where your PICC was inserted or emergency.</li> </ul>

## Do not use force to flush the PICC.
